




Agriculture Department





Division of Home Economics

The Division of Home Economics focuses its program of study toward the field of learning which provides knowledge and services primarily concerned with strengthening family life; uses the knowledge drawn from the physical, biological and social sciences, and the arts; and aims to help individuals and families to develop competences fundamental to effective living in the economic, psychological, political and social situations they will face in the future.

It further emphasizes the need to develop constructive understanding and appreciation of desirable relationships, beauty of surroundings, high social, moral and ethical ideals, physical fitness, and creativeness in meeting our day-to-day problems of the home and family well-being.

OBJECTIVES:

The curriculum in Home Economics is planned for students who wish: (1) To prepare for teaching Home Economics. (2) To gain background training required for various professional fields. (3) To gain general knowledge of Home Economics for personal enrichment. (4) To acquaint the young home-maker with some of the managerial skills and techniques necessary to meet the needs of persons living in a modern and changing world. (5) To educate youth for the dual responsibility of earning a livelihood and of living an effective life.

The curriculum leads to a Bachelor of Science Degree in Home Economics. Vocational and/or general teaching certificates may be obtained on the completion of the degree program.







The Concert Band is composed of select musicians and performs music from the symphonic band repertoire. The band functions in the spring and its annual formal concert is one of the significant events of the year.










