

Lions win conference title, miss playoffs by one spot

The Langston Lions football team played the season finale game against Wayland Baptist University on Nov. 16, with hopes of a conference title and a playoff berth

The Lions earned the conference title, but missed an appearance in the playoffs because they were not ranked in the top 20 teams nationally; they were ranked

Finishing the season at 6-4, the Lions went undefeated in conference play.

Jamil Hines, running back for LU, said the NAIA conference holds a point system that determines the seeding for the top 20 teams.

The top 16 teams in the final poll get into the playoffs, but if a team wins conference and is a top 20 team, that team gets an automatic playoff berth.

"Éven though our team won conference, we were not in the top 20 range in the final poll to be able to get the automatic playoff berth," Hines said.

Hines said if the Lions would have won at least one of their nonconference games, they would have been in a better position to get the playoff berth they deserved.

Taylor Berry, a senior running back, said the team could have worked a little harder throughout the sea-

"Looking back, we could

have watched film and prepared better," Berry said. We should have won two out of the first four games, and finally, everybody has to be accountable on and off the field."

Talibb Woods, senior cornerback, said he thinks it is very unfortunate that LU didn't make it to the play-

"I believe that if we didn't have such a tough schedule, our chances would have been much greater," Woods

"Those four losses we had at the beginning of the season hurt us dramatically," Woods added.
