Tolson, former Professor of English and Drama at Langston University, appears in the Fall, 1969, issue of <u>Satire Newsletter</u>, a semi-annual periodical whose latest issue is devoted to Satire and Humor in Black American Literature. Author of the article on Tolson is Dr. Joy Flasch, Professor of English, who is currently completing the first book-length study of his work for the Twayne United Authors Series.
