SATURDAY, JULY 22

"La Bal d'Au Revoir". Paris is the central theme for "La Bal d'Au Revoir", which will honor Langston University summer graduates. All college students are invited to attend this early morning affair which will begin at four o'clock and end with breakfast at eight in the Ballroom of the William H. Hale Student Union.

Upward Bound. The Coronation of "Miss and Mr. Upward Bound" will take place in the Ballroom of the Student Union at eight o'clock Saturday evening. A Coronation Ball will follow the Coronation Ceremony.

SUNDAY, JULY 23

Sunday Activities:

Morning Meditations. Guest speaker for Morning Meditations will be the University's President, Dr. William H. Hale. All members of the University family are invited to attend services on this the last Sunday of the Summer Session.

Upward Bound Seminar. A discussion on "Diet and Nutrition" for Upward Bound Students will be held in the William H. Hale Student Union at 4 p. m.

Senior Recital. At 4 p. m. in the I. W. Young Auditorium, Mr. James Gilyard, tuba player from Lawton, and Mr. Donald Jordan, cornetist from Oklahoma City, will be presented in Senior Recital. The Recital fulfills partial requirements for the Bachelor of Arts degree.

Summer Theatre Activities. The production of Tennessee Williams' The Glass Menagerie will climax summer theatre activities on campus. Sunday and Monday evenings, July 23 and 24, in the William H. Hale Student Union. This will be the first production by the Dust Bowl Players to be presented in the popular theatre-in-the-round style of staging. The cast of THE GLASS MENAGERIE is as follows: Melzenia Mansker, a sophomore social science major from Tulsa, will be seen in the difficult role of Amanda Wingfield. Leonard Smith, junior English major from Detroit, Michigan, will be seen in the demanding role of Tom Wingfield. Making her first appearance with the Dust Bowl Players in the role of the fragile Laura Wingfield will be Janis Hale, a freshman sociology major from Langston. Detroit, Michigan, will be represented again by the fourth member of the cast with sophomore Gordon Blackburn as the Gentleman Caller. Doors will open at 7:15 each evening and because of limited seating capacity of the arena theatre, early arrival is advised. No one will be seated after the performance has begun.

NOTE: Because of the presentation of "The Glass Menagerie", the movie scheduled for this evening will not be shown.

Senior Recital. Mr. Herbert Greaves, lyric baritone, will be presented in Senior Recital at 8 p. m. in the I. W. Young Auditorium. Mr. Greaves, a native of New York City, will be accompanied on the piano by Mrs. Amelia R. Taylor, retired Professor of Music at the University. Mr. Greaves' recital is in partial fulfillment for the Bachelor of Arts degree at the University.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 26

Upward Bound. At 3 p. m. in the Ballroom of the Student Union , an EXTRAVAGANZA featuring Upward Bound Students will be held. Among activities scheduled are: an Art Exhibit, Fashion Show, Scenes from Plays and Selections by the Upward Bound Chorus and Band.

Movie. An Eastman Color Film, "A Study in Terror", will be featured at 8 p. m. in the Ballroom of the Student Union.

Final examinations for the Summer Session are scheduled for the 27th and 28th of July.

Upward Bound Awards Assembly--Banquet. At 10 a. m. in the Student Union, Upward Bound students will receive awards and commendations based on excellence in the performance of academic and extra-curricular activities. A banquet for Upward Bound personnel will culminate the summer Upward Bound Program. This event will take place at 8 p. m. in the Student Union.
