ENROLLMENT PROCEDURES

Fill out Student Information Form in Admission Office, Page Hall Annex; Pick up "registration pack" from same office; Report to respective Advisor for completion of class schedule; After completion of class schedule, persons enrolling in Professional Education courses should report to the Division of Education Office, Moore Hall, for approval of Director of Teacher Education.

The next step is return to Admission Office

to pick up class cards; Take entire pact to Office of Dean of Academic Affairs, Page Hall Annex, and leave it there to be checked for possible errors; Report to the Computer Center Station, first floor, Hamilton Hall, to see if schedule has been approved or rejected; If approved, a Computer-Produced Schedule will be issued which you should take to the Business Office for payment of fees; If rejected, returned to Advisor.

If you have not completed all steps by Jan. 9, 1976, you will be dropped from the enrollment system and must start over again at Admission Office on Jan. 12 -- at which time a late enrollment fee will be charged.
